Passwords for surviving partners

Recently I successfully helped two bereaved people who were faced with the problem of an unknown computer password.

In each case the surviving partner was unable to access important data on the deceased's computer simply because they did not know the computer password. It is generally advisable for both partners to know the access password(s) to one or more family computers.

Failing this, it would be sensible to leave both access and other account passwords in an envelope with the family solicitor.
