
This is a great idea – giving people a chance to meet and get to know other members whilst in lovely surroundings. The locations will regularly change but all details of venues and times will be in the newsletter.






Our August Friday walks, about 4 miles:- leaving at 10.30

There is to be a day of talks and stalls about climate problems and solutions. We hope that some of these will be of particular interest to your members.

Saturday 9th September 2023 at Small World Theatre, Cardigan, SA43 1JY.

The day will run from 9.30am to 5pm. You can come to the whole day or any part of it, but please arrive 15 minutes before any talk you would like to attend. So please arrive by 9.45am for the first talk. Many thanks.

The event is being organised by Cardigan Extinction Rebellion (XR).

Suggested donation of £2 - £10 for attending the day or any part of it.

TALKS

There will be 4 talks looking at different aspects of the problems being faced because of the climate and nature crisis, and how we can move towards solutions. The 4 talks are:

- 10-11am 'The Colour of Climate Justice' by Jeremy Williams, author of Climate Change is Racist: Race, Privilege and the Struggle for Climate Justice.
- 11.30-12.30pm 'Gardening in a Crisis' by Jake Rayson, a wildlife forest garden designer
- 1.30-2.30pm 'Teifi Estuary in Climate Change' by Tim Wright who has been monitoring natural process change occurring in the Teifi estuary and at other locations on the Cardigan Bay coast over the past 15-20 years.
- 3-4pm 'Climate Science and Activism' by Dr Hazel Beaumont, a Senior Lecturer in Geoscience, teaching at the University of the West of England.

Hot drinks and food will be available (for donations) in the breaks between talks.

<u>Cardigan u3a groups Co-ordinator</u> <u>Job Description</u>

U3a is a self-help organisation.

Members of individual u3a groups organise themselves into Interest
Groups with one or more of the members of that Group taking on the roles of voluntary Group Leader, expert advisor or administration organiser, etc.

Very occasionally, where really expert leadership is required -but is not available within the Group- the Group may provide some remuneration to a specialist tutor or leader.

To assist those Group Leaders in setting up their groups, and helping them whenever required in the ongoing running of those Groups, there is an Interest Groups Coordinator – and a short description of his or her role is as follows:

1. To encourage the formation of new and interesting Groups (and

- start additional groups when some are full).
- 2. To encourage members to take on leadership roles within Groups.
- To organise and lead a kick-off meeting for each potential new Group.
- 4. To support and offer training to Group Leaders in the basic u3a ways of doing things.
- 5. To be the main u3a Committee contact for any issues in the running of the Group.
- To maintain the Groups Planner document that shows the dates of meetings of all the Groups each month.
- 7. To organise a meeting of all Group Leaders approximately annually to share experience.
- 8. To organise the display of all Groups' activities at the annual Cardigan u3a Open Day.

Cardigan u3a Website manager role.

Summary of role: Payments:

The Cardigan u3a (WordPress) website is hosted by **Astutium**.

- (a) Arrange payment of the hosting fee every March.
- (b) Arrange payment of the domain fee every February.

General tasks: 1. Regularly updating the WordPress version and plugins. These updates are generally few and far

between these days. In the past there seemed to one every month.

- 2. Updating the Events page by adding or removing text.
- 3. Updating the quarterly walk lists for the 3 Walking Groups (Strollers, Tuesday and Friday). This is probably the most common task, with a total of 12 updates per year.
- 4. Editing pages and uploading media very little to do here.
- 5. Editing Committee names and photos. This is a once-a-year job, after the AGM.
- 6. Keeping the forwarding of e- mails up to date. Again, this is rarely needed.
- 7. Arrange payment of the annual Astutium invoices for domain name and website hosting renewal. Again, this is once-a-year job.

It would be extremely useful for me to be able to show the new person(s) how to deal with the item #8 above in March and February 2024. It is very simple for me to supply the new person(s) with all the necessary information on a USB drive, or contact website@cardiganu3a.org.uk

Godfrey Green who has been managing this role very effectively for 10 years **must stand down by April 24th**, therefore we would like a member to come forward sooner so they can learn what is necessary in the job.

It is estimated that it would cost us £600 a year if we had to pay professionally to cover this important position on the committee.
