Write yourself a letter:

Write a letter to yourself, when you were a young person, as though you were writing to someone, but telling them what you have been doing, where, when, what happened during the day, or week. You can type it up on the computer to start - then you can go back to it if you think you may have missed something. When you have finished it on the computer and feel confident enough, try writing it in a letter form, so that they can sit by each other. That way, people can read your letter. It is rather like a diary, but in a letter format.

Trace & Map your village

Find an ordnance map, or an old MAP of your village and try to locate your property. See what is in your surrounding area and if you can TRACE anything historical. Was there a castle, mansion, or workhouse? Was there someone famous/historic, who lived in your house - how old is your property etc. Try and find out what happened in your area. This is a great way to discover the history of your village.

March Monthly Meeting report

<u>OXFAM</u>

The speaker at the Cardigan u3a meeting on March 27th was Lizzy Bailey, the manager of the Oxfam shop in Cardigan. Lizzy began her talk by giving a short history of Oxfam. Founded in 1942 in Oxford by two academics as the Oxford Committee for Famine Relief, it was set up in response to the Allied blockade that caused famine in Axis-occupied Greece. Four years later, the first Oxfam shop opened in Oxford and it is still trading today. The number of shops has now expanded to 560 nationwide.

The first overseas committee was founded in Canada in 1963 and, in 1965, the organisation changed its name to Oxfam. In 1995 Oxfam International was formed by a group of independent non-governmental organisations.

Oxfam has 23,000 volunteers working in a variety of settings, including Oxfam shops, offices and at events like festivals, contributing to fundraising and campaigning work.

Lizzy continued her presentation by talking about the work that Oxfam does. Oxfam's core priorities are to end poverty and injustice by fighting the inequalities that fuel them through advocacy, humanitarian response, and community-led development, with a focus on gender justice, climate action, and holding power to account. Oxfam

works with local organisations all over the world rather than 'parachuting' people in to 'solve the problem'.

Lizzy gave examples of countries that Oxfam has been working with and the issues the respective countries have been facing:

Myanmar (cyclone, ongoing violence)

DRC (ebola, conflict, hunger)

Bangladesh (flooding, issues pertaining to having the largest refugee camp in the world)

Zimbabwe, Mozambique, Malawi and Zambia (work with those affected by El Niño)

Countries in East Africa (humanitarian response)

Ukraine (war - working with grassroots organisations - transport and food)

Gaza (war - humanitarian work - clean water, hygiene kits)

To help address issues that communities are faced with, as well as campaigning and lobbying governments, on the ground they assist with practical solutions, such as reinforcing homes prone to flooding and building homes on stilts. Oxfam help build schools and provide supplies like books and also help to build clinics.

One of their lobbying roles is that of addressing women's rights in the belief that lasting change is in the hands of women. On a practical level, Oxfam support women in developing sustainable businesses to enable them to work their way out of poverty.

Coming closer to home Lizzy gave an example of the work done by Oxfam Cymru, which has one employee. The local organisation supported the Senedd in its policy to provide free school meals to all primary school children.

Even closer to home, Lizzy talked with passion about the Oxfam shop that she manages in Cardigan. She is the only paid employee but will soon be joined by a deputy manager. Her work is supported by 30 volunteers who assist in a variety of capacities: creating window displays, taking photos for the website, working in sales, treasurer, health and safety, administration. Lizzy brought along a selection of Fair Trade products that can be found in the shop, including Easter eggs, coffee, items made from saris, felted goods and seeds. These can be found for sale alongside the more usual clothes and books found in charity shops. The annual turnover is £130,000 with online sales doing well, reaching £10,000.

Lizzy would like to expand community involvement, such as working with schools.

Her inspiring talk gave members an insight into the work undertaken by Oxfam both internationally and locally.
